



## **Christian Aid Call for Short Term Consultancy- End of Project Evaluation**

Christian Aid is working with others to end poverty in Africa. At the heart of this vision is transformation of the lives of people who live in poverty, empowering them to have a brighter future. The Nigeria country programme presently focuses on Community Health and HIV, Accountable Governance and Gender. In partnership with a wide range of international and local organizations, Christian Aid conducts research, builds capacity, and provides technical assistance to CBOs, CSOs and other organizations across the five states including the FCT.

Concerned with the high humanitarian needs of citizens in the northeast states of Nigeria caused by insurgency of **Jama'atu Ahlis Sunna Lidda'awati wal-Jihad (JAS)**, commonly known as Boko Haram related violence and military measures/operations, which have left widespread devastation in the region, forcing more than 2.2 million civilians to flee their homes. People trapped in conflict affected areas fear death and abduction and many are missing, while the destruction of infrastructure and disruption of livelihoods have exacerbated pre-existing low levels of access to education and health services. Boys are forcibly recruited by armed groups and thousands of women and girls have been subjected to sexual abuse, enslavement, while some have been used as suicide bombers. Communities in Adamawa, Borno, Gombe and Yobe that have been in relative calm are hosting most of the IDPs, overstressing food, water and the provision basic services. Maiduguri, Borno's capital, alone has received almost half of all the IDPs in the north-east.

Christian Aid is implementing a humanitarian response project to reduce morbidity and suffering among the IDPs and local communities hosting them in north-east Nigeria resulting from the violent armed conflict.

The objectives was to deliver selected and targeted life-saving interventions to the most vulnerable IDP and host communities in selected LGAs in Adamawa, Borno and Gombe states; and to build the capacity of local CSOs and community groups to participate effectively in assessing, articulating and delivering humanitarian interventions.

After 12 months of implementation, CAID needs the service of external evaluator in assessing the entire project implementation process and impacts on targeted population.

The purpose of the evaluation is to assess the effectiveness and efficiency of the project design, implementation process, achievements of its results and objectives as well as lessons learned and recommendations that will benefit the design of future interventions in the northeast.

CA will share the output of the evaluation with partners and relevant stakeholders such as UN agencies, SEMA, clusters/sectors and INGOs.
